CLINICAL ASSISTANT PROFESSOR OF SOCIAL FOUNDATIONS OF EDUCATION

The University of Florida invites applications for a Clinical Assistant Professor of Social Foundations of Education position to work within the Teachers, Schools, and Society program area in the School of Teaching and Learning. The Teachers, Schools, and Society program area focuses on issues that impact 21st century education and teacher education, as faculty and students study the intersections of curriculum, teaching, and teacher education with society and politics in an increasingly diverse world. This position builds upon a rich tradition of excellence in teaching and scholarship on the interrelationships between schools and larger societal contexts. The successful applicant will join a collaborative, cohesive, and energetic community of scholars within the College that is committed to high quality teaching, research, and service.

We welcome a candidate whose teaching and scholarship focuses on issues of critical national and global importance in social foundations of education including: sociological, anthropological, philosophical, comparative and/or historical perspectives in education; matters concerning race, class, gender, sexuality, ability, and/or socially just practices; the roles of schooling in a democratic society; critical, theoretical, and foundational approaches toward teacher preparation and professional development. Our faculty and students share a commitment to vibrant and equitable schools for a healthy democracy.

The successful applicant for the Clinical Assistant Professor position is expected to teach and advise undergraduate & graduate students; further their scholarship of teaching at meetings of professional organizations and through appropriate publications; and engage in service to the program, school, college, university and profession. This renewable 12-month non-tenure-accruing faculty appointment will begin August 2019. Salary is negotiable, competitive, and commensurate with qualifications and experience.

RESPONSIBILITIES:

- Teach (face-to-face, blended, and/or online) courses at the undergraduate and graduate levels.
- Advise undergraduate students majoring in Education.
- Participate in program development
- Provide service to the program, school, college, university, and the profession
- Conduct scholarly activities commensurate with expectations of a clinical faculty member

REQUIRED QUALIFICATIONS:

- Doctorate in Social Foundations of Education, Curriculum and Instruction, or closely related field.
- Record of excellence in teaching in K-12 and/or higher education contexts.
- Demonstrated academic commitment to matters concerning race, class, gender, sexuality, ability, and/or socially just practices.
- Commitment to active engagement with and/or leadership in Social Foundations of Education professional organizations.
- Record of scholarship as demonstrated through publications and presentations at national conferences (commensurate with experience)
- Evidence of commitment to collaboration with faculty, students, and other stakeholders.

DESIRED QUALIFICATIONS:

- Teaching, research, and/or service experiences with diverse populations.
- Record of effectively mentoring students.
- Ability to positively contribute to the regional and national visibility of the Teachers, Schools, and Society program.
- A commitment to working in an interdisciplinary teaching and learning environment.
- Experience in teaching blended or online classes as well as face-to-face classes.

APPLICATION PROCEDURES:

Applicants for the Clinical Assistant Professor position should: (1) submit a letter of application addressing required and desired qualifications; (2) submit a curriculum vitae; (3) submit a one-page statement of teaching about the value of Social Foundations of Education in a diverse society; (4) arrange for three letters of recommendation to be submitted through the UF application

system. Additional evidence of effective teaching and scholarship may also be requested. Candidates should submit application materials electronically at <https://jobs.ufl.edu>.
