I am grateful to Alisa Chapman, Jon Yoshioka, John McIntyre, Robin Leonard, and Michael Vetere for providing guidance, resources, and a collaborative spirit. This document contains three components: points of pride, chairpersons' reporting, and the coordinator's next steps.

Points of Pride

- Eleven of the thirteen active SIGs facilitated sessions at the 2024 Annual Meeting.
- The 11:50 a.m. and 4:30 p.m. time slots worked well, yielding a well-balanced program of SIG sessions with three or four SIG sessions for each of the time slots during two days of the annual meeting.
- The proximity of meeting rooms was appreciated. In other words, an atmosphere conducive to perceiving that "this is where the SIGs meet" permeated the area.
- The technology worked beautifully!
- There are approximately three new SIGs in the formation process.
- One new SIG was established: Practitioner Inquiry, co-chaired by Nancy Dana and Craig Mertler.

Measures:

Based on the needs identified by our members in the member survey distributed last year, we have developed a series of Zoom chats for our members to attend and engage over hot topics in our field. We will continually survey our membership to ensure the needs assessment is current. In addition to professional development opportunities, we are working to foster fellowship and celebration among our members. We launched a Member Update survey to understand the accomplishments of our members, and we will spotlight members throughout the year. We have also created a shared drive where we can share resources and materials, as well as the scholarship of our members.

Outcomes:

• Mathematics Teacher Educators

Goal(s):

Building a growing community of mathematics teacher educators at ATE, sharing current research, seeking insights into the distinctive nature of mathematics teacher education, and exploring new directions in mathematics teacher education, such as AI integration.

Timeline: August 1, 2023 – April 30, 2024

Measures: 1. Call for proposals and reminders (August-September 2023)

- 2. Proposal review and letters of acceptance (September-October 2023)
- 3. Communication with SIG membership about MTE SIG 2024 (February-March 2024)
- 4. Annual Meeting (March 29, 2024)
- 5. Letters of Appreciation to presenters (April-May 2024)

Outcomes:

- 1. Five (5) presentations were reviewed and accepted for the 2024 ATE Conference.
- 2. The MTE SIG was attended well at ATE 2024, with 26-30 attendees, possibly the largest audience in the past decade.
- 3. The MTE SIG streamlined the process of call-for-proposals, proposal review, speaker notification, SIG flyer, and acknowledgments, which we plan to follow for future conferences.
- 4. There seems to be a growing interest among the ATE membership in Mathematics Teacher Education.

2024 Session: The MTE SIG met on March 29, 2024, from 4:30 pm to 6:30 pm, accommodating five (5) presentations at the ATE Conference in Anaheim, CA. The presentations covered five (5) significant themes of mathematics teacher education: Modified Schema-Based Instruction (MSBI) for Students with Disabilities, Computational Thinking in Early Childhood Computation, Math Anxiety Mitigation with Early Childhood Math Teachers, Learning Geometry with GeoGebra Technology, and Emerging Issues of AI in Math Teacher Education. The SIG meeting was very well attended by MTE teacher educators and the general audience. The room was packed. There were such rich discussions about the presentations at the SIG meeting that we ran out of time for the last two presentations. The discussion went beyond the regular scheduled time. Looking into future meetings, we may need to schedule it for more time or to avoid conflicts with plenary meetings or receptions to allow for more follow-up conversations among the attendees.

Multicultural Education

Goal(s):

The purpose of the Multicultural Education SIG is to establish, within the organizational structure of the Association of Teacher Educators, an ongoing forum dedicated to the generation, dissemination, and critique of scholarship that informs curricular and pedagogical thought, practice, and policy about social justice in teacher education. Our scope encompasses K -12 schools, undergraduate and graduate programs, and community agencies. Multicultural education is interpreted as advocating for equity across, and at the intersections of, race, ethnicity, class, gender, sexuality, spirituality, exceptionality, nationality, immigrant/refugee status, and language.

Timeline: On-going

There are regularly scheduled leadership meetings throughout the year, and one business meeting is held at the annual conference.

Measures:

- · Growth in Attendance at SIG Meetings

- · Donations from Multicultural Education SIG Members

Outcomes: Membership participation in multicultural research and scholarship

The business meeting held in Jacksonville, FL, 2023 had 46 people in attendance and raised \$1,815.

The business meeting held in Anaheim, CA, in 2024 had 19 attendees. We are currently waiting on the balance from this conference.

2024 Session: The Multicultural Education Special Interest Group meeting commenced with a warm welcome and introductions led by SIG Chair Vanessa Louis. Each attendee shared their name, affiliation, and a single word encapsulating their experience of the conference thus far.

Vanessa Louis brought attention to an ongoing project, "Preserving the History of the Multicultural SIG," which aims to collect the SIG's historical narrative. Members were encouraged to contribute by providing historical data on the group's milestones and evolution.

Members were provided with a link to contribute to the SIG's "Give Back" initiative, supporting two local schools, Theodore Roosevelt Elementary School

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and Thomas Jefferson Elementary School, underlining the SIG's commitment to local community engagement.

Discussion ensued regarding two vacant positions within the SIG, Vice Co-Chair and Secretary. The election process for these roles was outlined, with voting scheduled at the 2024 summer conference.

Dr. Karynecia Conner from the University of Arkansas was honored with the 2024 Dr. Anne Richardson Gayles-Felton Travel Award, recognizing her multidisciplinary research in education policy and curriculum theory, particularly her efforts to empower communities of color and develop pre-service teachers through a grassroots approach.

The meeting concluded with an enlightening presentation by The C5 Los Angeles Youth Foundation, part of the Local Community Speaker Series. The Foundation's mission, history, program activities, and participant profiles were showcased, emphasizing its work in changing dynamics for high-potential, under-resourced teens through leadership development and success-focused initiatives.

The group adjourned at 5:30 PM, looking forward to continuing efforts to foster multicultural education and support local communities through their engagement and initiatives.

Science Educators

Goal(s):

The Science Special Interest Group (SIG) is a community that empowers science educators at all levels. We are passionate about fostering a vibrant network of support for:

- Incorporating two ZOOM meetings (Fall and Spring) between the annual meetings to build better community and support between members.

Outcomes:

Building a community of science educators who support teacher education and teaching STEAM

2024 Session: Focus: The meeting explored the evolving landscape of teacher preparation and STEM instruction, particularly emphasizing incorporating new technologies.

Highlights:

- · Dr. Ute Kaden delivered a well-received guest lecture on the potential of Artificial Intelligence (AI) in teacher preparation and science teaching.
- · A lively discussion ensued centered around integrating AI tools, simulations, and project-based learning within the Next Generation Science Standards (NGSS) framework.
- · Members actively shared ideas and experiences concerning the application of these emerging technologies in preparing future educators and fostering effective STEM education.
- · A discussion about a possible SIG Name Change to STEAM SIG was discussed.

• Self-Study of Teacher Education Practices

Goal(s):

To provide a place of support for those new to and experienced in SSTEP. To facilitate connections between members seeking support, feedback, and mentorship. To establish a historical document of the SSTEP SIG to enable the transfer of leadership and establish a foundation for future chairs to build on.

Timeline:

Regularly provide updates and posts on the Facebook group over the next year. Offer at least one webinar on SSTEP practices (fall). Continue publishing an SSTEP newsletter (the first newsletter was in Spring 2024. We plan to send the newsletter once per fall semester and once per spring semester). If there is interest, facilitate a Zoom meeting about one month after the webinar as a

follow-up. Document previous activity of SIG as a historical document (summer). Roundtable Session at next year's conference to facilitate feedback between members (2025 meeting).

Measures: Attendance at webinars and Zoom meeting

Monitor the number of members on an updated website and in a Facebook

group.

Outcomes: Increased membership participation in webinars, Zoom follow-up meetings, and

roundtable discussions.

The university and school-based members are encouraged to share teaching ideas, research, syllabi, course outlines, and resources to help meet the challenges of preparing professional

teachers for today's educational demands.
